1. Background:

The World Health Report 2008 highlighted insufficient recognition of the human dimension in health as a major shortcoming in contemporary health care, resulting not only in inequities and poor social outcomes, but also in diminishing returns, in terms of health outcomes, on the investment in health services.

Person-centered healthcare aims to tailor health systems and services to the specific situation of individuals and communities; that is to orient and organize services around the health needs of individuals and populations. The implications of person-centered medicine for the education and training of healthcare providers is to strive for a more balanced focus between disease, technology and providers needs and the health needs, values and preferences of individuals and populations. As stated in the World Health Report 2008, to put people first means to give balanced consideration to health and wellbeing as well as to the values and capacities of individuals, populations and health workers.

Yet today, the education of health care providers too often develops skills, competencies, clinical experience and expectations that are poorly suited to the health needs, values and capacities of much of the population. This session will present experiences and initiatives to shift the focus of education and training of medical personnel towards a more person-centered approach.
